9-1-1 Association Participates in Wireless E9-1-1 Grant Program

COLUMBUS, Ohio (August 15, 2002)—The National Emergency Number Association (NENA) announced today that it has accepted a grant from Wireless E-911: The PSAP Readiness Fund. NENA will use these funds to supplement and strengthen the Association's efforts to foster implementation of wireless enhanced 9-1-1 services across the country. Specifically, NENA will use this grant to expand activities already initiated under a contract with the US Department of Transportation (USDOT), and will include the delivery of focused technical assistance to those states struggling with implementation issues, the resolution of technical, telecommunication-based problems where such are barriers to deployment, and increased education and training for 9-1-1 public safety answering points (PSAPs).

The PSAP Readiness Fund was established by Nextel Communications to assist PSAPs and other parties committed to the timely implementation of wireless enhanced 9-1-1. The Fund is administered by a newly organized, independent, nonprofit social welfare corporation established for this purpose. The Fund is directed by a board that includes, among others, representation from Giuliani Partners LLC.

"Being properly applied, these funds will be used specifically to help promote and foster wireless E9-1-1 services throughout the country," said John Melcher, NENA president and deputy director of the Greater Harris County (TX) 9-1-1 Network.
