Association Implements Team to Facilitate 9-1-1 Improvements

COLUMBUS, Ohio (September 30, 2002)—The National Emergency Number Association (NENA) is bringing together national leaders and experts from public safety, finance, policy, technology and the government to begin a historic process to establish priorities and set a course for our nation's 9-1-1 systems. Tasked with challenging conventional 9-1-1 thinking, solutions and systems, these leaders are developing 21st Century priorities and strategies for 9-1-1. The NENA Strategic Wireless Action Team (SWAT), a volunteer group of nearly 50, is charged with seeking ways to better serve the nation with 9-1-1.

SWAT is drawing on leaders from 9-1-1, private industry and the government under four elements: Technical, Operations, Policy and Finance.

Deploying the appropriate resources, technologies, tools, and expertise, SWAT is creating a consensus-building process with a mission to:

- 1. Complete a national E9-1-1 infrastructure;
- 2. Provide technical implementation and support teams for deployments;
- 3. Provide legislative and regulatory guidance and expertise;
- 4. Help facilitate state and federal policy education;
- 5. Advance PSAP readiness evaluation capabilities and structures.

Benchmarks and deployments established by SWAT will provide the 9-1-1 community with a level of expertise and planning to specific modern communications challenges and barriers. Providing outreach, communications and review tools to the 9-1-1 community, NENA SWAT will educate leaders and convene expertise when needed. SWAT recommendations and actions will strengthen the level of involvement and strategic planning for all 9-1-1 constituencies.

To encourage an open dialogue and process, SWAT is calling upon NENA members, leaders and constituents to join the effort by establishing 9-1-1 specific priorities and challenges for SWAT to address.
