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FOUR NATIONAL "9-1-1 HEROES" HONORED—YOUNG CHILDREN NOMINATED FOR CALLING 9-1-1 TO SAVE LIVES/PROPERTY

National Association Works to Raise 9-1-1 Awareness

COLUMBUS, Ohio (June 18, 2001)—Four young children will be honored June 18 during a National ceremony recognizing their bravery and life saving efforts. The National Emergency Number Association (NENA) and 9-1-1 for Kids are sponsoring the National 9-1-1 Heroes Program to honor children who called 9-1-1 correctly when confronted with an emergency situation.

NENA, with the help of its Illinois, Texas, Florida and North Carolina Chapters, located the child heroes and is sponsoring their trips to the NENA Annual Conference and Trade Show in Orlando where the event will take place at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, June 26. (Event details follow.)

"Educating our children about the proper use of 9-1-1 is a key part of what makes our Nation's public safety response system work," said Norman Forshee, NENA President. "These children have shown that everyone can make a difference when 9-1-1 is used properly to save lives and property." Forshee will present the children with awards and letters of commendation from Governor Jeb Bush.

The NENA Annual Conference and Trade Show is the largest event dedicated to educating 9-1-1 professionals from the US and Internationally. With over 2,000 conference attendees, this event brings 9-1-1 together to discuss critical issues and plan for the future. Conference highlights include: the National 9-1-1 Heroes Program, debut of the Wireless 9-1-1 Certification Program, 9-1-1 Strategic Vision Panel, 2001 William Stanton Award.

National 9-1-1 Heroes Event

WHAT: The National Emergency Number Assn. (NENA) and 9-1-1 for Kids will honor four young "heroes" who called 9-1-1 correctly when confronted by an emergency situation. The names of the heroes and a description of their 9-1-1 calls are:

- **Brandon Pope,** age 5 (when call was made) from Centralia, IL called 9-1-1 from a wireless phone when his mother suffered a seizure and fell. Brandon had never used or was instructed on how to use a wireless phone. While wireless callers cannot currently be located by 9-1-1, Brandon quickly gave the dispatcher the address and help was on the way.
- **Ethan Heard,** age 9 from Arlington, TX, called 9-1-1 when his stepbrother was found unconscious in the family pool. Ethan alerted his father who then pulled the little boy from the pool and started CPR.
- **Johnny Carr**, *age 6 from Milton*, *FL*, called 9-1-1 when his father had exhausted his oxygen supply and could not breathe.
- **Michael Mathis**, age 7 from Lexington, NC called 9-1-1 when his mother suffered a seizure and became unconscious while driving. Michael also pulled the car over to the side of the road.
